

This year marks sixty years of the presence of the United Nations Peacekeeping Force in Cyprus (UNFICYP). On 4 March 1964, the United Nations Security Council adopted Resolution 186, recommending *“the creation, with the consent of the Government of Cyprus, of a United Nations Peace-keeping Force in Cyprus.”* The first peacekeepers, military and police officers, arrived in April 1964.

UNFICYP is tasked *“in the interest of preserving international peace and security, to use its best efforts to prevent a recurrence of fighting and, as necessary, to contribute to the maintenance and restoration of law and order and a return to normal conditions.”* Following the Turkish invasion of Cyprus in 1974 and the displacement of the population, the Force assumed a humanitarian mandate in providing emergency assistance to the population and, in conjunction with the parties concerned, *“to take appropriate measures to provide for their (refugees’) relief and welfare and to permit those people who wish to do so to return to their homes in safety”* [SC Res. 361 (1974)]. UNFICYP also facilitates the efforts of the good offices mission of the Secretary General in the *“continued search for a peaceful settlement.”*

In its sixty-year history, UNFICYP has played an invaluable role in carrying out its mandate. The people and the Government of Cyprus pay tribute to the United Nations, the forty-four UN member states that have, since 1964, contributed with tens of thousands of troops to the Force, as well as to the countries that have supported UNFICYP through voluntary and assessed contributions. Special tribute is paid to the 187 peacekeepers who lost their lives in the service of peace in Cyprus.

UNFICYP has successfully prevented a recurrence of fighting. Its presence is required until a lasting settlement is reached, ending foreign occupation and reuniting the island and its people; UNFICYP’s presence in Cyprus remains necessary until the establishment of peace.

Warm welcome for UN's newest peacekeepers

SOLDIERS of former Falkland Island lion, Britain and Argentina, took hands at Larnaca airport yesterday as an advance party of Argentine soldiers arrived to take part in the UN's peacekeeping force.

Twenty-three officers and nine newly drafted in their blue berets and matching blue crests, received a warm welcome from British UN soldiers. A further 200 more will arrive in the middle of next month making the Argentine contingent in UN's Cyprus Force.

The arrival has ensured the viability of the force when the British contingent is withdrawn.






U.N. Force produces newspaper

“YOU have no territories to win, no enemies to conquer”, U.N. Secretary-General U Thant tells members of the U.N. Peace Force in a message published in the first edition of the Force’s weekly newspaper ‘Blue Beret’.

U Thant says in his message: The officers and men of the Force have a very special task to perform. They are soldiers of humanity, pledged, without national or other interests, solely to the prevention of bloodshed and violence and to the restoration of normality in Cyprus. They serve the noblest purpose that an armed force could serve.

British major missing from U.N. Force

UNITED NATIONS troops are searching for British Major Edward Macey, 46, serving with the U.N. Force in Cyprus, who is believed to be missing. British sources said yesterday. A search is also reported to be going on for the Major's driver and Land Rover.

The Major was serving with the U.N. Force as Senior Liaison Officer at the office of Dr Kuchuk, the vice-President, in the Turkish quarter of Nicosia.

The sources said Major Macey, who is from the Royal Army Ordnance Corps, speaks Greek and Turkish. Anxiety about his whereabouts stemmed from his failure to attend a briefing of the UN Force Commander, General Giani, with his staff of officers at U.N. Headquarters at 5 a.m. yesterday.

The United Nations spokesman said later the Major and his British driver, also a member of the U.N. Force, had been officially listed as missing and their relatives informed.

They have not been sent since about 11 a.m. on Sunday, when they were at Dr. Kuchuk's office.

The whole of the UN force has been alerted to find them, the UN spokesman said. The UN spokesman said, "Greek Cypriot and Turkish Cypriot police have been alerted about them. We are anxious to know their whereabouts" the UN spokesman said.

An official Government statement last night confirmed that Cyprus police have been informed by the UN that an officer and a private of the British contingent of the UN Force are missing.

All police units were immediately alerted and a search was begun for the two missing.

4. In Nicosia area, after a quiet night, fighting developed in the vicinity of the airport at 0930 hours and continued throughout the morning until 1230 hours when the Chief of Staff of UNFICYP arranged a cease-fire. The airport was declared a United Nations controlled area.

6. Further requests the Secretary-General to continue to provide emergency United Nations humanitarian assistance to all parts of the population of the island in need of such assistance;



In the period of 20 July to 20 August 1974, in the execution of its mandate, UNFICYP sought to arrange local ceasefires and assist the afflicted population and casualties.

In the aftermath of hostilities, UNFICYP assisted the High Commissioner for Refugees, the ICRC and other international organizations in relief efforts. Rendered assistance to the victims of fighting, facilitated deliveries of medical and food supplies and worked for the location of missing persons and the release of prisoners.

REPORT BY THE SECRETARY-GENERAL ON THE UNITED NATIONS OPERATION IN CYPRUS

(for the period 6 June to 6 December 1976)

"19. The cease-fire lines of the two armies extend to a length of about 186 kilometres across the island, from Kato Pyrgos on the north-west coast to Dherifolia near the east coast south of Pafos. The buffer area between the two lines, which is patrolled exclusively by UNFICYP, is approximately 1 to 6 kilometres in width and covers more than 3 per cent of the territory of the Republic of Cyprus. The UNFICYP position in that area is based on the requirements of the maintenance of the cease-fire called for by the Security Council, as these have been established many years of United Nations practice. Thus it is an essential element of the cease-fire that neither side can exercise authority or jurisdiction beyond its own forward military lines or make any military moves beyond those lines. It follows that, in the area between the lines, the status quo (including innocent civilian activities and the exercise of property rights) is maintained, without prejudice to an eventual political settlement concerning the disposition of the area. UNFICYP discharges certain responsibilities in relation to the cease-fire, as well as humanitarian and normalization functions, with a view to safeguarding the legitimate security requirements of both sides, while giving due regard to the humanitarian considerations."







The demining programme in the buffer zone was concluded in 2011 with the assistance of UNFICYP and the UNDP and funding from the European Union, the Government of the Republic of Cyprus and donor countries. As a result 27,000 landmines have been removed from the buffer zone and approximately 10 km² of land have been cleared and returned to civilian use.
